




Design Concept: Collection within the Forest, Memories for Exploration Bathed in the vibrant green forests, the building's geometric design contrasts beautifully with the layers of rich red that mirror Linkou's red earth. Inside, the National Archives keep pieces of history alive. The exterior combines glossy glass and matte stainless steel, allowing natural light in and creating an open, airy feel. Around the park, visitors can find the "Forest Ramp," the steel artwork "Mist as Scenery," and the sparkling "Pond of Moon Illumination," all adding to the beauty of the space. From "Forest Ramp," looking back at the path you came from, it feels like you're walking through memories, each step drawing you in to discover more.

Architectural Goals: Green, Smart, and Open Blending environmental ecology, energy-saving design, and comfort, the building feels alive. Its open spaces and transparent layout connect the green treetops outside with the interiors, bringing people closer to the archives. Smart building safety systems and green energy facilities keep everything running efficiently. The design also considers public convenience by extending improvements to nearby sidewalks and streets to create a friendly, easy-to-use environment – one built for sustainable operation and development.

Landscape Integration: Ecological Renewal, Nature and Culture Combined Inspired by people's longing for untouched nature, the building occupies only a quarter of the site. The landscaping follows the area's original ecosystem, preserving 74% of the natural secondary forest intact to maintain its rich ecological memory. Together with the nearby Linkou Sports Park, it forms a vibrant green corridor in the city, providing nature the space to thrive. Lush greenery flows into public areas where people can relax, creating a space where architecture, nature, and culture coexist in harmony.





Green Building Label – Diamond and the Intelligent Building Label

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# Collection Management

Preserving National Memory: Collect Widely, Gather Smartly The National Archives bring together important records from all levels of central and local government, along with rare documents from private organizations. Following a whole-of-government approach, the acquisition focuses on seven main areas: government affairs, national security, public resource management, finance and economics, education and culture, social development, and local affairs. The goal is to illustrate the story of Taiwan's democracy and economic progress while also incorporating records of diverse cultures and emerging issues. The National Archives also acquire Taiwan-related materials from overseas national archives, as well as unique documents from individuals and organizations that reflect different perspectives and social diversity, thereby preserving a rich and irreplaceable national memory.









Deepening the Archives: Expand Capacity, Diversify Types



The capacity of archives grows from 30 kilometers to 100 kilometers at its opening – almost as tall as stacking 200 Taipei 101 towers.

Most of the collection consists of official government documents, but it also includes valuable historical records, photos, videos, and artifacts in both paper and multimedia formats. Many early documents still show the bold strokes and handwritten marks of the time, carrying great historical and educational value. The oldest item dates back to 1743 during the Qing Dynasty's Qianlong era. Another highlight is the "Taiwan Railway Archives (1895–1989)," which became the first archive ever listed by the Ministry of Culture as a significant antiquity due to its rarity and irreplaceability. The collection also holds key records from the early phase of the retrocession of Taiwan, as well as the 1987 order that ended 38 years of martial law – powerful reminders of the country's resilience and the true spirit of democracy.

Ensuring Proper Preservation: Smart, Secure, Automated Management



Before any record enters the National Archives, it undergoes sterilization and inspection. Then it is stored in climate-controlled rooms suitable for its media type. After that, there comes cataloging, duplicating, disposition, and preservation work. To ensure that archives are preserved forever, the National Archives use mechanical transport systems and digital technology to move archives in and out smoothly, supported by a dedicated storage system that keeps every archive secure and traceable. The Archives Repository follows a "room-within-a-room" design – two 15 cm reinforced concrete walls with mineral wool insulation and cement fiberboard in between, plus an air buffer of at least 100 cm. The floors are built extra strong, supporting up to 1,200 kg per square meter. This setup keeps temperature and humidity stable, saves energy, ensures security, and can handle heavy loads. Together with the onsite "Archives Preservation Center" and "Electronic Records Technical Service Room," the facility collaborates with industry, government, academia, and research groups to improve long-term preservation. Every detail is carefully managed – keeping memories intact yet accessible.

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# **Public Spaces**



#### "01 Encounter: Archives Gallery

The floor-to-ceiling windows let in the park's scenery and soft, warm light, creating a comfortable space for people to wait, meet, interact, or relax. Along the walls, interactive displays share the stories behind the archives – showcasing knowledge, national treasures, and the history of the facility – giving visitors their first introduction to the world of archives.




#### "02 Reflect: History as a Mirror

Walking from the second to the third floor, visitors will arrive at one of the most striking spots in the building. To the left, tall windows frame a view of lush greenery. To the right, next to the stairs, a towering display of a thousand linked panels catches the light, shifting like waves of layered memories. Reproductions of precious archives are printed on them, making it feel like walking through the pages of history. Pause for a moment, and the stories within seem to breathe – inviting visitors to step into a journey through time.

#### <sup>103</sup> Journey: Time Corridor

In the most enchanting U-shaped hallway of the second-floor gallery, every step brings a new view. The right corridor, themed "Where Time Goes," uses everyday images paired with traincar designs and whimsical illustrations to show how life has changed over the past 50 years. In the middle section, visitors can pause for a short break before moving to the left corridor, themed "Archives · Creation." Here, archives are reimagined as creative cultural works, and a screen plays historical footage from across the year – visitors can select clips to create and take home their own unique memories of the visit.









#### "04 Remember: Permanent Exhibition

Following the Time Corridor into the permanent exhibition hall, visitors will encounter mirrored art installations that project various national archives, reflecting the light and shadows of history. This is where the "Islands Reading: Our Stories" exhibition begins. The space is filled with memory links, scenes, and archival objects that transport visitors back to the postwar years of large-scale migration to Taiwan and reveal a vibrant Taiwan shaped by globalization. The five sections each tell a story, highlighting the era's background and key turning points. Through creative interactive displays and immersive settings, visitors can feel the flow of the past – while also imagining what the future might hold.





#### "05 Engage: Fun! Archives

Located at the corner of the permanent exhibition hall, this section showcases the diversity of archives in both type and form. It highlights professional processes such as archives acquisition, preservation, conservation, and application, combined with immersive metaverse-style technology for a fun and educational experience. Visitors get a rare glimpse into the behind-the-scenes world of archives, where skilled staff carefully preserve and repair archives – almost like stitching together memories – keeping the life of each archive alive.

#### "06 Showcase: Special Exhibition

Using archives as the centerpiece and exhibits as the medium, the venue regularly hosts themed special exhibitions that reveal the stories behind the documents. These exhibitions transform archives into engaging experiences, helping diverse audiences understand their meaning and significance. Through old handwritten pages, silhouettes, and historical photos, visitors can explore the lives of people from the past. At the same time, the displays highlight collective memories across generations, connecting everyone through shared experiences of national development, social change, and daily life.

## "07 Research: Archives Access Center

On the third floor, the Archives Access Center offers access to archives, including viewing, hand-copying, and duplicating services, as well as books and journals on archival history. The space combines paper, digital, and multimedia formats within a smart, tech-enabled environment. Historical records are now linked to the cloud system, so with just a few clicks, visitors can explore thousands of documents. Through the authenticity, uniqueness, and connections within each archival record, visitors can trace origins, study history, and reflect on the past – discovering and appreciating the true value of archives

#### 08 Delight: Archives Story House

Memories of the past remain in many forms, and to help preschool children create fun learning and play experiences, it offers an imaginative and playful space. Here, the mascot "Archives" lead children on joyful adventures with four best friends – Paperweight Girl, Bamboo Ruler Boy, Miss Needle, and Mr. Brush. Using archives combined with storytelling, handson installations, and AR drawing, kids can paint little scenes of history in their own worlds, planting seeds for curiosity and learning about archival research.

#### "09 Relax: Gift Shop, Food & Café

The archives are full of everyday moments – food, clothing, housing, travel, education, and leisure. To help visitors carry these rich memories home and share them with friends, the gift shop offers more than just practical items. Each product tells a profound story drawn from the archives, blending culture and history in ways that make it an irresistible keepsake. Alongside this, the cafe serves specialty foods and drinks. Visitors can savor a cup of coffee or tea while enjoying the calm, green views outside, allowing them to create an exclusive memory that is both colorful and memorable.
